The campaigns under her direction experienced significant investment increases amidst a challenging public school landscape facing massive budget cuts. In the corporate realm, Laura managed over 35 worldwide licenses in 45 product categories for the men's designer brand Perry Ellis International. After leaving there, she managed a multi-industry executive portal for an internationally renowned

celebrity. Her involvement included the following industries: apparel, film, music, marketing, and nonprofit event management. Throughout her career, Laura has demonstrated her corporate sensibility for nonprofit work. Through implementing diversified revenue strategies, showing return on investment for funders, and using creative vision, she raised millions of dollars to address complex social, health, and community issues. Bernadette Sánchez is a Professor of Educational Psychology at the University of Illinois at Chicago. She is an expert on mentoring relationships and the positive development of urban, low-income adolescents of color, particularly Latinx and African-American youth. Her research is on the role of formal and natural mentoring relationships in youth's educational experiences, the resilience and resistance of youth who are marginalized in U.S. society, and the racial and ethnic processes, such as racial discrimination and racial/ethnic identity, that impact the development of youth of color and their relationships with mentors.

Her current research projects are on a) the role of mentoring in adolescents' science and ethnic/racial identities and b) an evaluation of a racial justice training intervention for volunteer mentors of youth of color. She has received funding from the National Institutes of Health (NIH), National Science Foundation (NSF), William T. Grant Foundation, and local foundations for her mentoring research. She was also a Distinguished Fellow for the William T. Grant Foundation. Bernadette is a member of the Research Board for the National Mentoring Resource Center and is a Fellow of the Society of Community Research & Action. She is committed to disseminating her work to a broad audience, including academic journals and through workshops, trainings, Op-Eds and blog posts for mentoring practitioners and youth workers. She is a first-generation college student and loves teaching and mentoring students at UIC.

David Shapiro MENTOR he/him/his



David Shapiro is the CEO of MENTOR, the unifying national champion for expanding quality mentoring relationships for young people. Under Shapiro's leadership, MENTOR's efforts to build capacity and scale innovation within the mentoring movement have been highlighted by the Social Impact Exchange, the Stanford Social Innovation Review, and Grantmakers for Effective Organizations. During his tenure, MENTOR launched *In Real Life*, a national mentoring public awareness campaign, with the support of the NBA and has worked extensively with the Obama Administration on the mentoring component of My Brother's Keeper. In addition, the U.S Department of Justice Office of Juvenile Justice

and Delinquency Prevention selected MENTOR to establish and lead the National Mentoring Resource Center.

Shapiro was previously the CEO of MENTOR's Massachusetts Affiliate, Mass Mentoring Partnership (MMP). During his tenure, MMP grew by 400 percent, increased state funding for mentoring, attracted federal funding and distributed almost \$1 million in financial assistance, capacity building, and match activities to mentoring programs. The number of young people matched increased by almost 50 percent during Shapiro's seven years at MMP. Shapiro's experience includes leadership positions with the U.S. Golf Association Foundation's 10-year, \$50 million grant-making initiative and the American Red Cross of Massachusetts Bay. He chairs the board of the Mass Nonprofit Network and serves as a volunteer leader with a variety of nonprofits, including America's Promise Alliance, Common Impact, and the Institute for Non-Profit Practice. Shapiro is a husband, father of two sons, and mentor.
